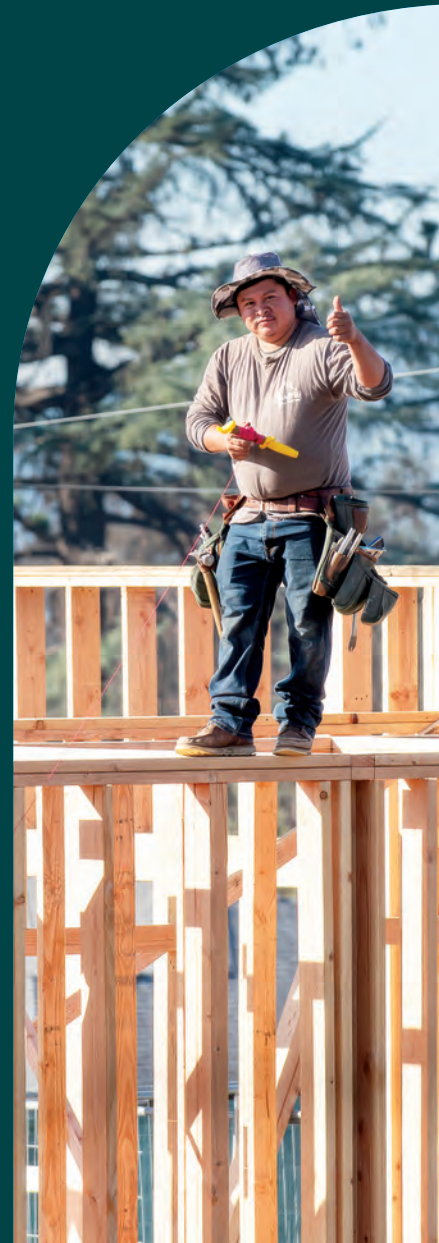

The Mazur Endowment for Greater Pasadena

Linda Mazur and her late husband, Elliott, built a life rooted in curiosity, community, and a shared commitment to giving back. They made Pasadena their home in the early 1990s and quickly immersed themselves in its cultural and civic life. They loved the city's blend of vibrant arts and close connection, where attending a concert or lecture meant seeing familiar faces. For Linda, community has always meant surrounding herself with people who share her values, whether through volunteering, philanthropy, or simply showing up for local events.

Elliott worked happily outdoors as a house painter while pursuing

Continuing a Legacy with PCF

For longtime PCF donors Susan Toler Carr and Darrell Carr, their son Justin has always been their guiding light. After his sudden death in 2013 at age 16 from cardiac arrest, they turned grief into purpose. Through Pasadena Community Foundation, they created the Justin Carr Wants World Peace Foundation scholarship fund to honor his creativity, compassion, and commitment to lifting others up. Their ongoing philanthropy, centered on young people, reflects that spirit by focusing on education, community programs, and heart health. Each act of giving carries forward the compassion and light that defined Justin.

In 2024, Susan and Darrell joined PCF's Legacy Society, naming the Foundation as a beneficiary of their estate. "After losing Justin, we were devastated not only by his absence, but by the loss of the future we had been building for him—the legacy, the life, the

good he would do. At a PCF lunch, we learned more about legacy giving at the foundation. In that moment, a weight lifted from our hearts. We realized our dreams for Justin did not have to end; they could live on through others. Including PCF in our estate plan allows us to ensure that his vision and values will continue to make a difference for generations to come."

Just months after joining PCF's Legacy Society, the Carrs lost their Altadena home of 27 years to the Eaton Fire, and within it, countless tangible memories of Justin. Though the fire took what could be seen and held, the Carrs' plan with PCF ensures that Justin's spirit, values, and vision will continue to carry forward for generations. PCF will steward their legacy, and Justin's, with the same integrity, compassion, and community focus that has always guided their family's philanthropy.

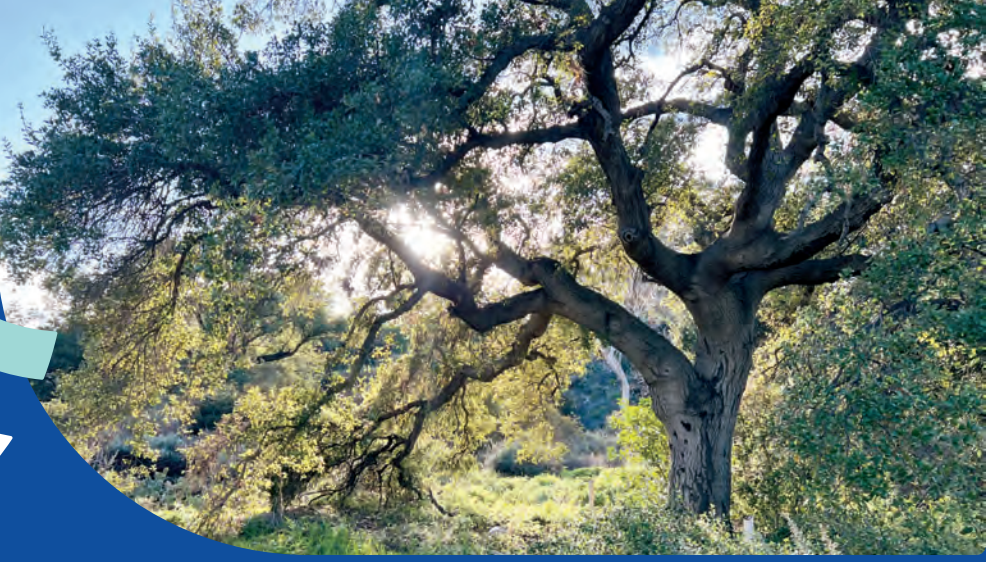

The grants provide vital funding for capacity building and community engagement while recognizing the vital role trusted messengers play in keeping all members of our community informed, connected, and resilient.

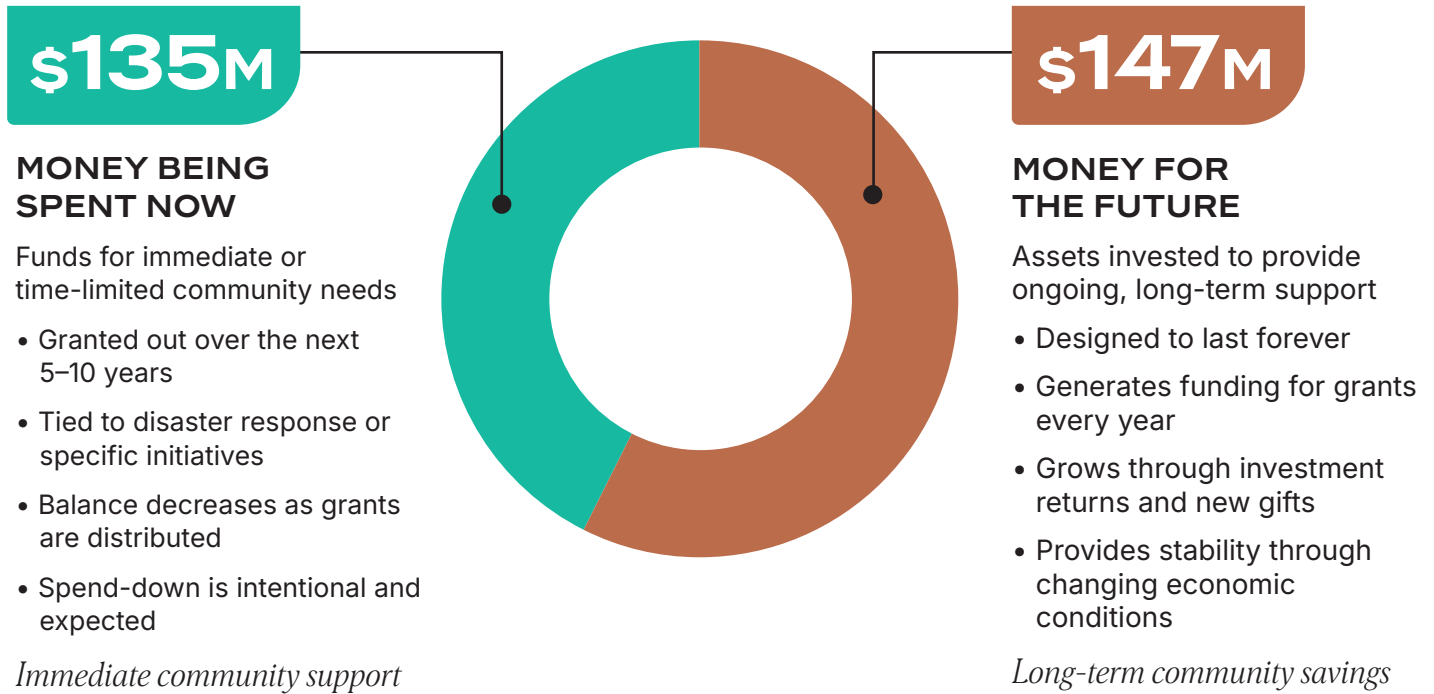

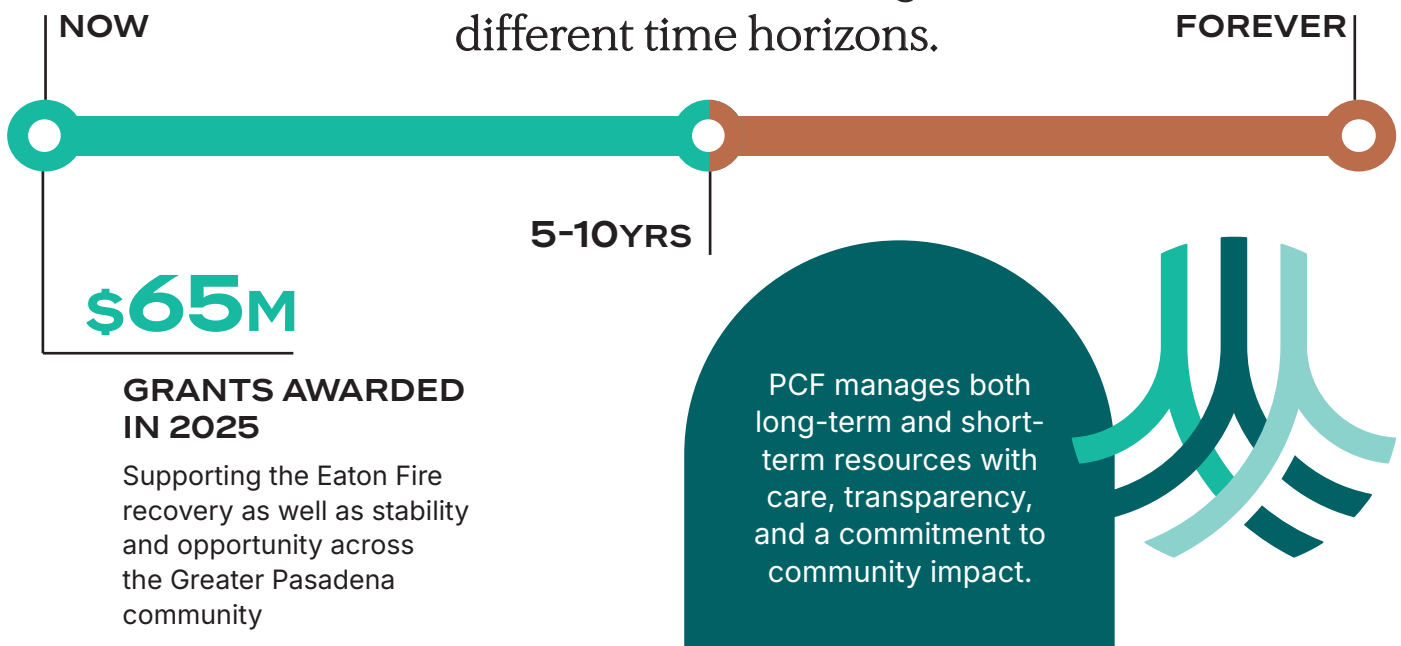

Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund

Established on the morning of January 8, 2025 as the Eaton Fire continued its devastating path, Pasadena Community Foundation's Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund became a lifeline for our nonprofit partners and their clients following the catastrophic fire. Thanks to the incredible generosity of donors, PCF was able to swiftly deliver cash assistance, essential services, emergency housing and childcare, case management services, and much more to thousands of residents impacted by the fire.





ONE YEAR LATER

Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund

The Eaton Fire reshaped Altadena, Pasadena, and Sierra Madre in ways that will be felt for generations. Nineteen neighbors lost their lives, and more than 9,000 structures—including over 6,000 homes and rental units—were destroyed. The emotional, physical, and financial toll on survivors has been profound.

Local nonprofits have been PCF's steadfast partners in our fire response. Their deep relationships, cultural understanding, organizational infrastructure, and on the ground expertise allowed them to leverage PCF's Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery funding immediately and meet families' needs without hesitation. This collaborative approach provided essential stability at a moment when families were facing profound loss and uncertainty.

The examples that follow illustrate how individual nonprofits applied their PCF Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery funding. These snapshots represent only a portion of their fire responses, which extended well beyond the measurable outcomes presented here.

HOW NONPROFITS USED PCF'S EATON FIRE FUNDING

Immediate Support for Families

Boys & Girls Club Pasadena quickly distributed cash payments totaling \$50,000 to 34 Club families who lost their homes and helped seed its Family Assistance Fund, which ultimately supported 225+ impacted households.

Supporting Older Adults

In Altadena, where over one-fifth of residents are older adults, many elders confronted the loss of legacy homes and difficulty navigating recovery resources. Pasadena Village supported 36 older adults with gift cards for emergency needs, then

pivoted to long-term recovery focused on peer support, community connections, preparedness resources and help with technology, transportation, and mental health services.

Rapid Cash Assistance

Victory Bible Church quickly became a central hub for relief efforts for both its congregation and the broader community after the fire. Monies from PCF’s Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery fund enabled the church to direct cash assistance ranging from \$500 to \$1,000 to 40 families.

Reaching Disproportionately Impacted Households

YWCA of San Gabriel Valley supported 27 households with direct financial assistance. Most recipients were older adults, and the program reached predominantly Black and Hispanic/Latinx households disproportionately affected by the fire.



Foothill Family Services

Mental Health and Emergency Aid

Foothill Family Services prioritized responsive mental-health services to help families navigate trauma and begin rebuilding stability, while also ensuring that 20 individuals across 17 households received immediate cash assistance for temporary housing, essential supplies, and basic living needs.

A SAFE PLACE TO LAND

PCF Donors Help Secure Housing for Fire-Impacted Families

Jessica Villanueva was never someone who asked for help. But when the Eaton Fire destroyed her family's rental home on Alameda Street in West Altadena, she suddenly found herself with nowhere to go and no clear path forward. Turning to Door of Hope became the lifeline her family needed.

With support from Pasadena Community Foundation's Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund, Door of Hope was able to walk alongside Jessica, her two adult children, her sister, and her parents as they searched for stability. PCF directed \$725,000 to Door of Hope, allowing the organization to tailor assistance to each survivor family: covering deposits and rent, connecting them with therapy and health care, and helping with job searches and other essentials. Twelve families found immediate shelter through Door of Hope, and more than 130 survivors received additional housing support made possible by PCF donors.

For Jessica's family, the help felt nothing short of a miracle. Door of Hope secured a down payment, a security deposit, and two months' rent for a new home, along with furnishings and household goods. They also supported her sister's family and replaced her father's mechanic tools lost in the fire.

"Door of Hope took the stress away," Jessica shares. "At each step, my caseworker was there for me, asking 'What do you need?'"

A year later, that caseworker—Altadena resident Brenda Speight—is still checking in weekly. "This wasn't just another case for me," Brenda said. "Seeing my own community go through so much loss, I knew I had to step in. Because of the quick support from our funders, Door of Hope was able to show up for families when they needed it most."

Housing Support by the Numbers

Donors to PCF's Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund helped meet one of the greatest ongoing needs for Eaton Fire survivors: long-term temporary housing and rental assistance. That support allowed our housing partners, like those listed here, to help hundreds of residents move toward safe, stable housing when it mattered most. With PCF funding:

Friends in Deed supported 60 individuals with emergency motel stays and rental assistance.

Greenline Housing Foundation secured long-term temporary housing for 34 families.

Union Station Homeless Services served 192 individuals with case management and housing navigation, motel vouchers, and financial assistance covering lease application fees, security deposits, rental assistance and essential household furniture and supplies.

Civic Soul provided emergency motel vouchers and/or first month rent and deposits for more than 60 families.

Laying the Groundwork for Community-Driven Rebuilding

With support from PCF's Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund and other fire relief aid, Greenline Housing Foundation has emerged as one of the most influential forces shaping Altadena's recovery after the Eaton Fire, especially for Black and brown residents who faced the greatest losses. Long before the fire, Greenline was committed to protecting homeownership and preventing displacement. After the disaster, that mission became urgent.

Historical redlining practices led to the concentration of Black families in the areas of Altadena most affected by the fire. Now, speculative lot sales and displacement threaten to erase the Black community that has called Altadena home for decades.

Following a disaster like the Eaton Fire, there are myriad reasons why homeowners and renters alike might not be prepared to find interim housing and undertake the cost of monthly rent, especially in the very expensive Greater LA market. In some cases, those who face the inevitable financial pressures will make the difficult decision to sell.

Through our Eaton Fire Relief & Recovery Fund, PCF has partnered with Greenline to help advance its landbanking strategy and supply funding to stabilize families through interim housing.

LAND BANKING

With early support from PCF, Greenline launched the region's first emergency landbanking initiative to keep fire-damaged properties out of the hands of speculators. PCF funding made it possible for Greenline to purchase its first fire-impacted lot, a critical step that set the initiative in motion. Since then, Greenline has acquired a second property, investing more than \$1 million back into Altadena, with plans to secure additional lots. Their swift action ensures

that this land remains a community resource for generations to come.

INTERIM HOUSING ASSISTANCE

With a \$200,000 grant from PCF dedicated to rental assistance, Greenline has played a crucial role in helping fire survivors regain stability. To date, Greenline has helped 34 families secure long-term temporary housing and has provided more than \$550,000 in rental assistance—averaging over \$20,000 per family. This support has been a lifeline for residents working to rebuild their lives after the fire.

AN RV FOR LOUISE

After the Eaton Fire, several partners joined with community members to form the Altadena RV Temporary Housing Group: Greenline Housing Foundation, Making Housing and Community Happen, LA Voice, and PCF. Ten months of steady, heartfelt collaboration led to their first placement: an RV for longtime resident Louise St. Juste, just in time for the holidays, giving her a safe, dignified place to live while she rebuilds.

EATON FIRE RELIEF & RECOVERY FUND

Partners in Recovery

CHILDCARE RELIEF INITIATIVE

A Lifeline for Childcare Providers, Stability for Families

The Eaton Fire reshaped daily life for hundreds of families and the childcare providers they rely on, upending the steady routines and trusted relationships that help young children feel safe. In Altadena alone, 56% of childcare facilities were damaged or destroyed, and across the Greater Pasadena area, nearly 1,000 licensed childcare spaces disappeared overnight.

Pasadena Community Foundation partnered with three long-standing institutions with deep roots in early childhood care—Pacific Oaks College and Children's School, the Child Care Directors Alliance, and the City of Pasadena's Task Force on Early Child Development and Early Learning—to confront this crisis. Our collective

response was grounded in care, trust, and long-standing relationships, with partners continually circling back to providers to understand evolving needs and ensure no one was navigating recovery alone.

PCF awarded \$1.3 million to Pacific Oaks and its partners to help stabilize this essential network of caregivers, many of whom lost classrooms, materials, income, and, in some cases, their own homes that doubled as their businesses. By the end of 2025, 43 providers had used the funding to replace lost equipment and materials, relocate or safely reopen,

Providers replaced everything from cribs and rugs to outdoor play structures and learning materials. They also supported staff navigating trauma, offered tuition relief to displaced families, and created spaces where children could feel safe again.

and continue offering the comfort and continuity our young residents depend on.

Across the community, the Childcare Relief Initiative helped restore stability, dignity, and hope. It also affirmed that early childhood educators, so often the quiet backbone of family life, matter deeply, and that this community stands with them as they rebuild.

"When I lost my house and daycare in the Eaton Fire, I was in total shock. I lived in my home for 53 years. I began my daycare in 1977, so for 48 years I served the Altadena and Pasadena Community. In those years I regularly added to the toys and play equipment for the children. This grant has enabled me to purchase teaching supplies, toys, indoor equipment, and outdoor play equipment. (It) enables me to create family again with the precious children in our community."

Altadena Builds Back Foundation

In April 2025, Pasadena Community Foundation announced the establishment of the Altadena Builds Back Foundation (ABBF), a supporting organization committed to a community-centered rebuilding of residential Altadena. It serves as a critical pillar of PCF's long-term fire response with its efforts focused on helping homeowners and renters return to Altadena and preserving the character of this historically diverse, affordable, and vibrant town.

Like many of my neighbors, my wife and I have been displaced for months while our home undergoes remediation, giving me a deeper appreciation for what recovery truly means: it is not only about rebuilding homes, but about restoring stability, dignity, and the

spirit of our community.

The Altadena Builds Back Foundation (ABBF) was created for this reason. Established as a supporting organization of the Pasadena Community Foundation, ABBF is a community-centered effort focused exclusively on the long-term rebuilding of residential Altadena. With \$60 million secured from generous donors, ABBF can focus on initiatives that help homeowners and renters return to Altadena.

Our work has already taken shape in powerful ways, including our \$4.55 million partnership with San Gabriel Valley Habitat for Humanity to rebuild 22 homes for under- and uninsured families in West Altadena (see facing page) and, our \$5.83 million partnership with Beacon Housing (see page 30).

By investing in housing solutions, we are not only rebuilding what was lost but safeguarding the future of Altadena—preserving its character, strengthening its community fabric, and ensuring that future generations can continue to call it home.

As the ABBF board chair, I am humbled by the generosity and determination I see every day. Neighbors, nonprofits, and donors have all stepped forward to make ABBF's efforts possible.

One Year After the Fire: A Historic Milestone

One year after the Eaton Fire, ABBF is proud to share meaningful progress in the recovery efforts supported by our landmark \$4.55 million grant to San Gabriel Valley Habitat for Humanity, announced in June 2025. This investment is helping rebuild 22 homes for fire impacted families in Altadena.

The first Habitat home supported by our funding is nearing completion in March 2026. With lessons learned from this first project, construction is advancing steadily across the Habitat rebuild effort, with three homes currently in progress, six permits issued, and eight additional permits in the approval process.

This momentum reflects SGV Habitat's deep experience in affordable homebuilding and their innovative partnership with The Foothill Catalog Foundation, whose pre-approved architectural plans streamline permitting and lower pre-construction costs—helping families move forward more quickly and affordably.

Accelerating Recovery through The Foothill Catalog Foundation

To amplify rebuilding efforts in Altadena, ABBF also awarded a \$500,000 grant to The Foothill Catalog Foundation. This funding will support up to 50 Eaton Fire survivors who need accessible, cost-effective home designs as they navigate the complexities of rebuilding. Foothill Catalog's plans can reduce pre-construction costs by up to 95%, significantly shorten permitting timelines, and honor Altadena's architectural heritage. These benefits strengthen the Habitat rebuild effort and the community's long-term recovery.

Beacon Housing and ABBF Prioritize Renters

More than 77% of multi-family units in Altadena were destroyed in the Eaton Fire. Altadena now faces a deep shortage of rental housing, with many renters still unable to find affordable replacement housing.

When the Eaton Fire displaced thousands of Altadena residents, renters were among the most deeply affected. Last fall, the Altadena Builds Back Foundation, in partnership with donor Molly Munger, moved quickly to seize a rare opportunity: helping Beacon Housing purchase a lot that once held a 14-unit bungalow court.

ABBF viewed Beacon Housing as an ideal partner in its commitment to rebuilding Altadena's housing landscape. "We start with people who know our community the best, like Beacon Housing," says ABBF Project Director Candice Kim. "They're a hyperlocal nonprofit with a long track record of building community-centered affordable housing right here in Altadena."

This trusted partnership led ABBF, together with Munger, to provide \$5.83 million to secure the site and return crucial affordable housing to the community.

The project will rebuild all 14 units using modular, factory-built homes designed for durability and fire resilience. As

Beacon Housing Executive Director Palin Ngaotheppitak explains, "Our motivation in choosing prefabricated housing was to shorten the delivery timeline, as well as deliver homes that meet a higher standard for safety and durability. By selecting factory-built units designed with fire resilience in mind, we are looking to move faster to meet the urgent housing needs of our community without compromising build quality in the long term."

Once complete, the development will offer very low-income, fire-survivor renters the chance to return to stable, affordable homes, guaranteed for 55 years. It is a powerful affirmation that renters are essential to Altadena's identity and deserve a path home.

NEIGHBORHOOD SURVANTS

Creative Healing for Young Fire Survivors

"I feel like we're finally turning the page," says Michelle White, Executive Director of Neighborhood Survants. "At first, everything was urgent crisis support. Now we can slow down, listen, and understand what our families truly need."

Founded in 2019, Neighborhood Survants began as a small, youth-focused effort. But after the Eaton Fire, the organization became one of the community's most trusted anchors. They mobilized immediately, checking on displaced residents, delivering essentials, and showing up day after day for families facing fear, instability, and profound stress. Over the past year, their work has taken

root at the Eaton Fire Collaboratory in Altadena, where they coordinate resources, partner with the Department of Mental Health for case management, and walk alongside residents navigating the long road to recovery.

With PCF's Community Healing & Restoration Grant, Neighborhood Survants is now stepping into the next chapter: helping young people and their families heal from the emotional toll of the fire. The grant supports wraparound services designed to meet youth where they are, with mental health support delivered in ways that feel natural, joyful, and culturally grounded.

"We'll get real creative in getting our youth into therapy without making it feel so therapeutic," Michelle says with a smile. "We'll use music, dance, art—whatever helps them open up. So many kids are telling us they've never seen their parents this stressed. They're carrying that, too. They need this support."
